Beyond a “New Normal”

Living in Exile

We have been exiled — not by any person or persons, but by a pandemic. We are living in exile, banned from our beloved church and banished into a forlorn landscape devoid of our familiar fellowship and worship.

I find new meaning in the lament of the people of Israel after their beloved Jerusalem was destroyed and they were hauled off into exile in Babylon:

By the rivers of Babylon we sat and wept
when we remembered Zion.
There on the poplars
we hung our harps,
for there our captors asked us for songs,
our tormentors demanded songs of joy;
they said, “Sing us one of the songs of Zion!”
How can we sing the songs of the Lord
while in a foreign land?

Psalm 137:1-4

We aren’t singing “the songs of the Lord” in this exilic time, and the reality of the situation is that it’s tough. It is very sad and lonely here. We miss what we had and we can’t wait to get it back.

That’s why we hear so much talk in our society about “the new normal.” I’m sure you’ve heard it. It’s on television. It’s in the newspaper. It’s all over social media.

“I can’t wait to get back to the new normal.”

But I ask you, what kind of goal is that?!

I understand the attitude. In fact, I “resemble” that remark. I’ve said it myself. We tempted to tiptoe through these dangerous and

disorienting times and claw our way back to the closest approximation we can find of the life we had before. It’s only natural that we feel this way. In fact, it’s even commendable in the courage and civic virtue it inspires.

Here’s the problem in our giving in to this way of thinking. We may be letting the limitations of the moment cast a pall over the possibilities of new life that lie in store for us.

As the people of Israel hung up their harps on the poplars of Babylon and lamented their exile, God surprised them with a challenging and inspiring song of hope:

Do not remember the former things,
or consider the things of old.
I am about to do a new thing;
now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?
I will make a way in the wilderness
and rivers in the desert.
to give drink to my chosen people,
the people whom I formed for myself
so that they might declare my praise.

Isaiah 43:18-21

A word of incredible, unimaginable hope came to the people right smack dab in the middle of exile. And it came true! They soon found their freedom and deliverance from exile.

God is singing that song to us right now! God is preparing new things for us that will outshine our fondest memories of all those “former things” we are currently missing.

I don’t know what they are, but I just can’t wait to find out what God is up to, and I’m not about to limit my hopes and dreams to a “new normal!”

Regarding our Worship

When, What & Where?

Bishop Houglund met with the clergy recently (via Zoom) and addressed some questions that have been on all of our minds.

When?

The bishop says he will likely be slower than the Governor in reopening. He indicated that the Governor has many criteria to consider, while he will only be guided by concern for “the health and wellbeing of our people.” He suggested that we should not be expecting a reopening in the near future. He is not providing a projected date, as he is watching and will be guided by the uncertain course of the virus.

What?

When we resume worship, Holy Eucharist will not initially be the form that it takes. Resumption of celebrations of the Eucharist will come when times are safer, and only at the direction of the bishop. He asks that, when worship resumes, we alert persons in vulnerable demographics to the dangers involved in any gatherings, and suggest that

they continue to protect themselves at home. Social distancing and the wearing of facial masks will be a universal requirement.

Where?

Some parishes have already decided not to resume worship even when the bishop gives the go-ahead. They will wait for a future, safer time. These are parishes who worship in small church buildings, and they know that inside gatherings in small spaces are the most conducive to contagion.

We obviously worship in an intimate setting! Conversations among the leadership of Christ Church have led me to feel that we might be safer if we resume worship outdoors when the all-clear is given — at least for a few summer weeks. Social distancing requirements leave room for only a tiny attendance within the walls of Christ Church.

Suggestions have been made that, down the road, we consider seating folks throughout the various locations in our facility (church, parish hall & undercroft) in order to meet social distancing requirements. Another option that some parishes are considering is holding multiple services throughout the week for which parishioners sign up in advance.

These are not so much answers to the questions that are on all of our minds as they are a distillation of the questions we need to consider. We welcome your input and advice!


Construction UPDATE


VIA ZOOM MAY 15, 2020

Meeting Convened with Prayer by Fr. Tom

- Minutes from February 21, 2020 were approved
- Treasurer's report from January–April 2020 accepted
- Diocesan news and updates can be found on their webpage including links to Bishop Hougland's scheduled weekly and Sunday services. These are recorded for viewing at convenience.

Informational:

- Vestry members offered comments as to the status of our experiences and feelings as a community during the Pandemic of Covid-19. Grateful to have Fr. Tom so actively guiding CEC members to live our mission statement through his daily email messages, Tuesday Zoom gatherings, and Sunday Sermons that can be found on YouTube. Many have learned to be users of the Zoom technology to help grow and deepen our connection to one another. Still others continue to send notes, cards, make phone calls and even socially distance by car outside the homes of members to bring them the sunshine of song.
- ECW update included the following announcements: The August chicken salad sale is cancelled, regardless IF the Waterfront Art Show is held. New officers are President, Anne Stanley and Vice-President, Linda Wertz. THANK YOU Betty Stephen for your leadership during the past.

Discussion:

- Ideas and Approaches for Resuming Worship-at church Together: Senior Warden Miller attended the Northern Region Meeting via Zoom. Must-do details were communicated; (social distancing, use of masks and sanitizers, thorough cleaning of the facility between services). Creativity is encouraged with aforementioned limits and in view of CEC membership being among the most vulnerable health demographic. Have Fr. Tom stream services from the sanctuary via Facebook Live or Zoom?
- An at-home writing project is being developed to facilitate expression of unique connections to the natural world and honoring the existence and care of our planet. Details will be forthcoming.

Decision:

- Motion to transfer \$8,000.00 from the CEC Endowment Fund to continue scholarships for CEC scholarship recipients 2017-2019. Carried.
- Motion to approve CEC's Parochial Report. Carried.
- Motion to elect Diocesan Convention Delegates; D. Collier, B. Flanders. Carried.

Meeting adjourned with prayer, especially for those on CEC's prayer list.

Helping HANDS

When the COVID-19 Pandemic started to become worse, we were visiting Florida. As we were there, my husband and I began to see shortages in the grocery stores, pharmacies, hardware stores etc... Upon arriving home shortly after the beginning of COVID-19, I tried to locate masks for us and there was not a one to be found.

After searching tirelessly, I finally remembered that we had some masks in our shed, and, to our luck, they were the N95's! The life on those masks, however, were very limited. Even though these masks can be sterilized, they begin to break down after a few weeks. I knew I needed to find more for my husbands' health. As I was searching, I saw that there were shortages within the healthcare field. My immediate thoughts were how do I keep my husband and myself safe and how to help others as well?

After reviewing many mask patterns, I reached out to two friends, Edith Pair and Lea Peak, who decided to begin making fabric masks.

After reaching out to the hospital and other healthcare facilities, we found the need was much larger than expected; more need than we could produce.

One day I was in Oleson's at the checkout and in the lane next to me was a gentleman who was telling the cashier about how his wife was making masks. He informed the cashier that she had over sixty of them and did not know how to get these dispersed to the medical facilities who were still very much in need. Upon hearing this, I introduced myself and explained I was on the Munson Hospital

Charlevoix Foundation Board and would be able to assist. We exchanged phone numbers and, within a few hours, I was able to pick up masks and deliver them to the hospital.

A few days later, Edith contacted me and informed me Boulder Park rehab was in need of masks and we were able to accommodate their need. Our mask sewing continues as we all continue to distribute. All of us are reaching out to skilled nursing facilities and assisting in providing masks to the hospital in preparation for the hospital and offices be opened for full-service procedures. The masks will be used and provided to patients when they enter the hospital. To date, we have produced and distributed more than 250 masks.

We have worked with the Chamber of Commerce to place an announcement in the Charlevoix Biz Blast seeking sewers, quilting fabric, and elastic. So please, if anyone knows of anyone or is willing to assist us making masks, please let me or anyone working this project know!
